

Cynthia Irwin-Williams Lectureship

The 25th annual Cynthia Irwin-Williams Lectureship at ENMU was held on February 25. Our guest speaker was Dr. Kristina Baines, Associate Professor of Anthropology at CUNY Guttman Community College and Director of Anthropology for Cool Anthropology. Her presentation was titled "Heritage in the Body: Sensory Ecologies of Health Practice in Times of Change". She shared how members of two Belizean indigenous communities, the Maya and the Garifuna, maintain and adapt heritage practices through changes in Belize and after migration to urban cities in the US. The lectureship honors Dr. Cynthia Irwin-Williams (1936-1990) a renowned archaeologist who taught at ENMU from 1964 to 1982.

Courting Disaster: Experiences as an Expert Witness

As the parent department for ENMU's interdisciplinary Forensic Science program, we sponsored a guest speaker presentation in April. Cordelia Willis, who has been a criminalist with the Santa Clara County (CA) Crime Lab for 25 years, shared her experiences as an expert witness in court. This presentation was given in collaboration with the Jack Williamson Lectureship.

Faculty and Student Research

Dr. Elizabeth Lynch, along with Dr. Marcel Kornfeld of the University of Wyoming, presented a poster at the 2023 Society for American Archaeology annual meeting in New Orleans. The poster was titled "Undiscovered Country: The Ground Stone Tools Assemblage from the Hell Gap National Historical Landmark".

Dr. Elizabeth Lynch spent the 2023-2024 winter break on Grand Bahama as part of a Fulbright Grant. Her project is "Citizen Science Forest Recovery and Community Perspectives on Post-Hurricane Dorian Grand Bahama". She worked with faculty from the University of the Bahamas North to teach ethnographic methods related to citizen science and community outreach.

She returned to Grand Bahama in May to complete the Fulbright research and work on a U.S. National Science Foundation project: "Collaborative Research: IRES Track I: Post-hurricane recovery of island freshwater lenses:


Alumni Updates
