

- Once MATH 1220 is successfully completed, the student should then go directly toMATH 1350 (MATH 1218 is not required if MATH 1220 has been successfully completed).



Course Overviews and Descriptions

ENG 097: Basic Writing Skills

Students who enroll in this course can expect to learn the fundamentals of writing, such as creating a plan, paragraph construction, thesis statements, and more. Reading assignments focus primarily on the writing process, but the course also involves summarizing, discussing, and analyzing readings based on content, context, argumentation strategies, etc. Students can expect to write several paragraphs, discussion boards, journal entries, and at least one essay that consists of multiple paragraphs and 1-2 sources. Instructors offer individual support for students, schedule extra time for conferences, provide extensive feedback, and focus on revision. Students must pass ENG 097 with a C or higher in order to enroll in ENGL 1110.

ALC 210: English for Academic Purposes I

Students who enroll in this course will practice the four basic English language skills (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) in relation to academic topics and contexts. Special attention is paid to developing college-level academic reading and writing skills. Students learn about the writing process and develop different projects (paragraphs, essays, presentations) in which they practice their analysis, synthesis, argumentation, and exposition skills in English. This course also promotes the development of academic vocabulary and strategies for mastering notetaking, class discussion, and presentation skills in college.

ENGL 1110: Composition I (with Lab)

Students who enroll in this course can expect to learn the nuances of writing, such as reflection, rhetorical analysis, and argumentation as they would in ENGL 1110. However, this section includes an additional one-hour weekly lab with their instructor in which individual help and additional instruction is provided. Students can expect to write 3-4 essays of about five pages each. Two or more of these essays will include research and the citing of sources. The additional lab offers students more time to work directly with the instructor on these projects as well as smaller assignments, readings, and more. The lab section will count as a one-credit-hour elective. Students should be prepared to attend and motivated to participate in the weekly writing lab.

ENGL 1110: Composition I

Students who enroll in this course can expect to learn variations of writing, such as reflection, rhetorical analysis, and argumentation. Lengthy reading assignments are very common and involve discussion, interpretation, analysis, and rebuttals in response to the readings. Students can expect to write 3-4 essays of about 5-7 pages each, and many Composition I courses require reflections and/or course portfolios. Two or more of the essays in this course will include secondary research and the synthesis and citing of multiple sources. Composition I introduces students to the nuances and general process of research and the documentation of sources.

ENGL 1120: Composition II

Students who enroll in this course can expect to learn the more advanced aspects of academic and public writing. Emphasis is placed on research, including locating effective sources, synthesis, and the discovery process of research. In addition to numerous readings, reflections, and other process assignments, students can expect to write at least two major projects of 8 pages or more that often require primary research and include a variety of academic sources. Composition II builds on the research and writing skills learned in Composition I and invites students to expand their research and writing abilities with larger projects and new varieties of research.
